### The Newtown Room Visit

The Highland Skills Academy have invited our S1 and S2 pupils to their Newton Rooms in Inverness and Dingwall to participate in two different workshops. S1 will take part in a Renewable Energy workshop in January 2022 whilst the S2 will take part in a Biofuel workshop in December 2021. These workshops will enhance our science curriculum and allow our young people to experience science in a different context to the usual classroom setting.

## Young STEM Leaders Award



GUHS young people have been participating in the Young STEM Leader program and we have achieved SCQF Level 4 awards for our first cohort. The Young STEM Leader programme aims to promote STEM curiosity in young people and to encourage them to learn about the world around them in a fun and engaging way. As well as allowing Young STEM Leaders (YSLs) to leadership, develop important communication and employability skills, working towards a YSLP Award will also motivate young people to progress their STEM studies and perhaps eventually embark on a career in STEM.

In April and May 2021 a group of last year's S3 (now S4) pupils planned and delivered an amazing interactive workshop to our then S1 pupils during GUHS Activities Week. Those who completed all of the requirements to achieve the award will be presented with their award at the end of term assembly.

## Scottish Schools Hydrogen Challenge

A group of eleven S2 pupils participated in the Scottish Schools Hydrogen Challenge that was being run across Scotland by Arcola Energy.

In this challenge, the groups had to design and build a Lego car that would be powered by a hydrogen fuel cell. The distance each of the cars travelled was measured. Each of the teams produced amazing cars that travelled great distances, many over 20 metre's. GUHS winning entry travelled the second furthest of all of the entries from Highland schools. This meant the winning team won an entry to the final in Glasgow just as COP26 was beginning and a Lego kit for the school.

On Saturday 30th October, Mrs Angus took the team of 4 to Scottish Power Headquarters in Glasgow to participate in the final.

The team displayed amazing teamwork skills to go on and produce a hydrogen power vehicle that was scrutinised by many judges on its design principles and by how far it travelled. GUHS's all girl team went on to become the Scottish champions of the event! Well done to the team that went to Glasgow and to all of the people who participated in the Inverness event.

## **Pupil Parliament**
